July wouldn't be complete without a beautiful fireworks display! Here are some fun facts that you may not have known about the fireworks we love so much!

*Fireworks were invented different chemical in China sometime between 200 BC and 900 AD. Since then, fireworks have been used to mark important celebrations. China is the largest fireworks manufacturer and exporter in the world.

*Fireworks used to contain just three ingredients: saltpetre, sulphur, and charcoal. *Marco Polo, an Italian merchant and traveler, is believed to have brought fireworks from China to Europe around the year 1295.

*In 1830, Italy gave fireworks color. Bright colors are created when burning different metallic powders within fireworks tubes.

*Firework sounds can also be determined by combinations within the tubes. (Cylindrical tubes create whistling noises, aluminum flakes make hissing sounds, and flash powder is responsible for the big, loud booms.) *Americans love their fireworks. We purchased 163.6 million pounds of fireworks last year alone. And fireworks displays used another 23.1 million pounds.

*But it's not all fun. An average of 800 people per year wind up in the emergency room due to fireworks injuries. Have a happy and safe July!
